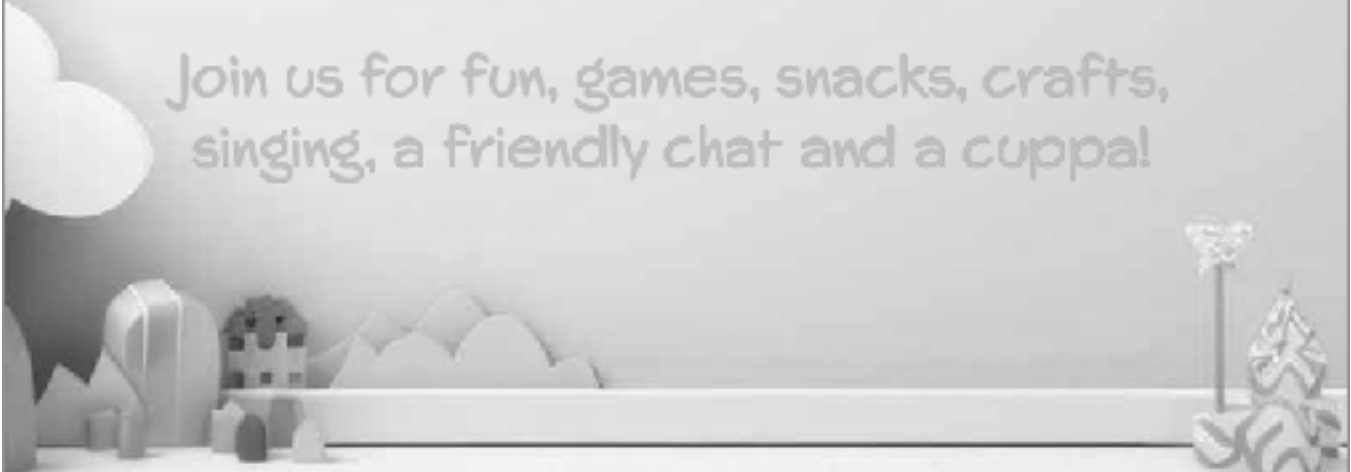

News from Shudy Camps Parish Council

The LHI (Local Highway Improvement) grant application for Shudy Camps Parish Council is still not complete. The posts have been installed but we have not yet been given a delivery date for the device (Mobile Speed Awareness Sign) when this report was submitted in May 24

The application for the Jubilee Green to be an official village green, which was submitted back in Jan 23, is also slowly progressing and likely to be completed in 2025.

Gigaclear Ultrafast Fibre Broadband : nothing further has happened but this was expected. Hopefully I will have more news in the next article or keep an eye on the agendas and minutes of the monthly meeting to see the progress (available on the village website).

The telephone box in Main Street had a little spruce up during April 24. There are also concerns whether it is Waterproof and Rodent Proof and the parish council are also looking into getting the exterior painted in the next few months.

The Church in Shudy Camps has also approached the Parish Council about installing a hand rail adjacent to the path leading up to the church gate. The PC has agreed in principle if this years budget will allow.

The Annual Parish council meeting took place in May 24, which is when the Chair and Vice Chair positions are formalised. After a number of years Anita Kiddy stood down as Chair and the position was filled by Justin Plumb and Simon Powell took on the role of Vice Chair. The parish council thanked Anita for her service as chair which is very much appreciated and thanked Justin for stepping up and taking on the role for the next year at least !

Since the last Review which featured actions from our January meeting, we have had meetings in February and April leading up to our Annual General Meeting in May.

A lot of time and energy was put in by Dicky Moore to tie up many loose ends during this time to ensure the charity could be left running smoothly after the AGM.

Sadly, our long serving chairman, Dicky Moore decided to stand down at the AGM after dedicating over 25 years of service to our community. We will surely miss his enthusiasm and motivation to run a successful organisation, with his hands on approach to solving many administration and maintenance issues, quietly supported, behind the scenes, by Tricia. We wish both Dicky and Tricia well in the coming years and it is good to know that Dicky is happy to advise the committee on future situations where his knowledge and expertise would be invaluable

In November Cindy Smith was co-opted to take over the role of Treasurer from Dicky and, at the AGM; Melanie Laing joined the trustee committee to volunteer as the new Chair. In the Officer Selection meeting immediately after the AGM, both these roles were confirmed by a unanimous vote of those committee members present, as were the roles of Terry Chapman as Secretary and Susie Culpin as Bookings Secretary. The other trustees who were re-elected are: Jo Bishop, Beverley Garbutt, Caroline Parkinson, Mike Peirson and Linda Shepherd.

The trustee committee can also co-opt up to three more trustees to fill the vacancies, so if you have practical, technical, administration and social skills we would love to have you onboard!

The new committee of trustees now has to establish procedures for regular maintenance inspections as well as considering how to approach the forthcoming retirement of the Secretary, who looks after a few contacts and contracts as well as recording Minutes, drafting Agendas and general administration. One action, nearing completion is the legal replacement of the lease holding trustees: Susie Culpin, Sue Herbert and Paul Sherville with the Charity Commissioners.

Since its formation, the “**Friends of Castle Camps Village Hall**” group has been active in arranging events and fundraising. It organised the recent successful **Open Day** in conjunction with the Parish Council and by the time you read this, also a Jumble Sale. As mentioned in the last Review, this new group is for residents who don't want to be formal trustees of the charity but want to help practically with running, fund raising and improving the Hall. 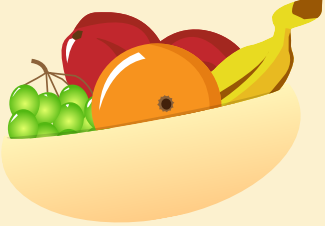

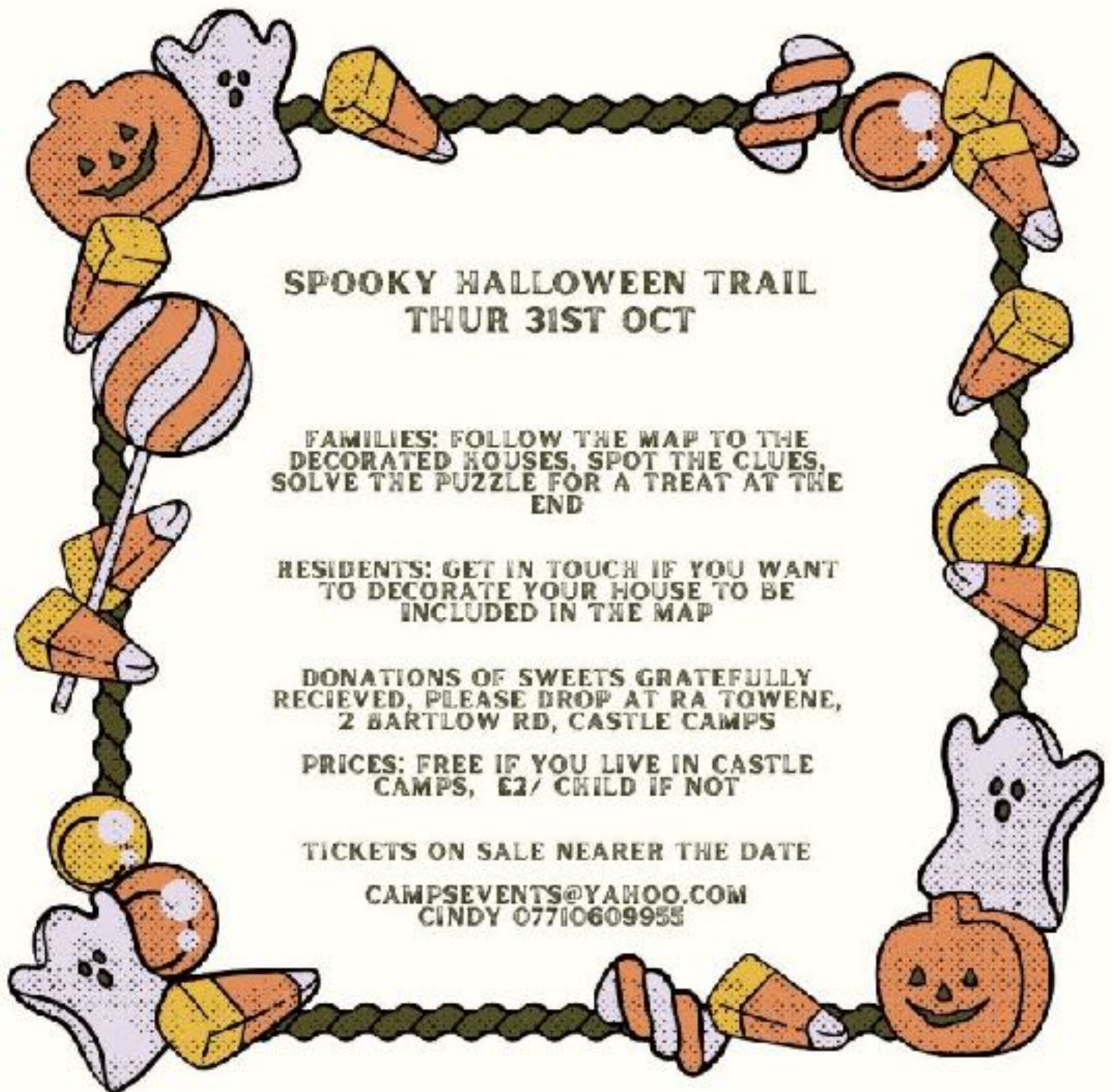

Granta Medical Practice Update

We continue to work hard to improve patient access. We have recently employed 7 new GPs, who are starting at various times over the next few months. Remember though, GPs aren't the only healthcare professional you can see, depending on your medical need.

"Pharmacy First" is an NHS service available via high street pharmacies where, if eligible, you can obtain prescription medicine without seeing a GP. The conditions that are covered by Pharmacy First are:-

- Earache (1 to 17 years)
- Impetigo (1 year and over)
- Infected insect bites (1 year and over)
- Shingles (18 years and over)
- Sinusitis (12 years and over)
- Sore throat (5 years and over)
- Uncomplicated urinary tract infections (women, 16-64 years old)

If you go to a pharmacy with one of these conditions, a pharmacist will offer you advice, treatment or refer you to a GP or other healthcare professional if needed. They will then update your GP health record.

If you are not within the above age ranges, a pharmacist can still offer you advice on these and many other conditions, and if they cannot help you directly they may signpost you to an alternative healthcare professional for treatment.

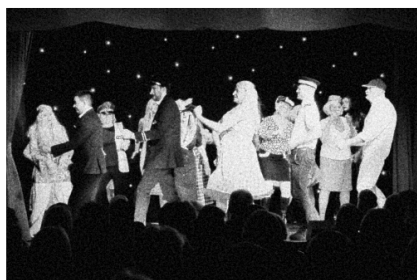
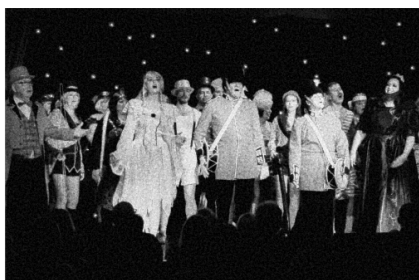
TOPCATS is the name of our up and coming youth starlets, 8-18 years old. Between them providing an outlet for budding thespians of all ages.

County & District Councillors Report

Four Day Week

The District Council are now at the end of their 15 months trial of a four-day working week. The results of this have been analysed by two independent universities – Cambridge and Salford. They found that out of the 24 key performance indicators measured, 22 showed that performance had increased or remained the same. The two that showed a decrease in performance were the amount of time to collect housing rent and the time taken to re-let council housing stock.

Staff turnover over the time period, especially in ‘hard to fill’ posts such as senior planners, has dropped by 40%. 11 bin lorry drivers left the council in 2022 whilst only 5 did in all of 2023 and 2024.

The next steps for the council will be to digest this, offer a consultation, and then make a decision whether to take the four-day week permanent or not.

Old Shire Hall

The old HQ of the County Council, Shire Hall in Cambridge, has been on the market to be sold since the authority moved from there a few years ago. After some years on the market, it now has a new buyer, who will be turning the historic building into a luxury hotel. As the building has many parts which are listed, the new operator will need to be careful when renovating.

Holiday Voucher Scheme

The County Council will again offer its supermarket voucher scheme to eligible families this summer holiday period. Every application can also help with some funding towards the child’s school, if they are also in receipt of Free School Meals. Rural Prosperity Fund

There is a new fund from central government, facilitated by the District Council, that is aimed at supporting rural communities with the aim to help support local businesses and communities. Anaerobic Digestion Plant Proposal – Streetly End

The planning application for a new anaerobic digestion facility at Streetly End, West Wickham was approved at the County Council’s planning committee on July 17th. Thank you to all those that engaged with the process and submitted comments to the County Council during the consultation period. A special thanks to those that attended and spoke at the committee meeting, as they represented their communities and neighbours very ably.

County & District Councillors Report

Physical Activity Grant

The District Council has launched a new grant for members of the voluntary sector, specialist group or leisure centre. It is to help with classes aimed at people with long-term health conditions. New Member of Parliament

South Cambridgeshire now has a new representative in Parliament – Pippa Heylings. As a new MP she is being inundated with emails and hasn't yet got permanent staff to assist with this workload (as it takes time to initially recruit and then to get them vetted by the security services). So, if you have written to her since her election, please do be patient.

Police Survey

War Memorials Grant Scheme

The War Memorials Trust is providing grants for the repair and conservation of free-standing war memorials in England intended to help those who are responsible for the upkeep of war memorials.

The grants support the care and preservation of war memorials to a high standard, and to prevent the decay of this important part of our built heritage. Grants will normally be for between 25% and a maximum of 75% of eligible costs. The maximum grant is £5,000 for non-freestanding war memorials while freestanding, non-beneficiary war memorials may be considered up to a maximum grant of £20,000. Coffee Pod Recycling comes to Cambridgeshire Household Recycling Centres

CCC has introduced coffee pod recycling at all nine of its Household Recycling Centres. The new coffee pod bins offer residents an environmentally friendly way to separately dispose of both aluminium and plastic coffee pods. Over 1 billion coffee pods are sold each year in the UK alone. Waste from these 'single-use' pods will lead to a huge environmental impact if not recycled properly, in the UK and globally. CCC is partnering with Podback to provide coffee pod recycling services.

Podback was initially created by Nespresso, Nescafe, Dolce Gusto and Tassimo to help their customers recycle their coffee pods and is now supported by many more coffee brands. Podback recycles coffee pods in the UK, to reduce waste and saving on new materials. Collected pods are shredded and cleaned of coffee. The shredded pods can be made into new products, while the coffee grounds are used to help create renewable energy and soil improver.

News from our Anglican Churches



Dear Friends,

I have just realised that on the 1st of July I am officially geriatric having hit the age of 65. I won't yet be an OAP because my retirement age is now 66. My attention was drawn to this by a friend who was making a special effort to come to my birthday barbecue to see how I was faring at this exalted age and have a good laugh.

One of the many changes that has taken place since I was born in 1959 is that I can look forward to several more healthy and productive years of life. In 1959 life expectancy was just over 70, now it is more than 81, and because I have avoided dying for 65 years, I can expect to live another 20 years. So much for the biblical three score years and ten! I don't want to parrot Macmillan by saying 'you've never had it so good' but I am old enough to remember putting on my wellies and my coat over my pyjamas to cross the snow-covered yard to the toilet, or waking up in a freezing bedroom with no central heating, or my mother washing the clothes in the sink. Although it might not seem it when we watch the news or read the newspaper a lot of things have got better; we are healthier now than

we've ever been, better educated, and there is proportionally less violent crime.

The development in technology over the last 65 years is almost incredible. When I first started using computers in the 1970s, they were enormous machines that took up whole floors of university departments which you programmed using punch cards, now I carry a powerful computer in my pocket which also serves as a telephone and a camera. We can thank the advances in biotechnology for the vaccines that curbed COVID and in some recent good news there was a deaf eleven-month-old who was given her hearing by a new gene therapy administered at Addenbrooke's.

There are a lot of things that are wrong with our world, but there are a lot of things that are right and good, but often they don't make it to the headlines. Those good things are, though, points where the kingdom of God has touched this world. Christians are meant to have a positive attitude to the world believing that God created the world and he saw it was good, that Jesus came and died to free us from the slavery to sin and evil, that the Holy Spirit is active in the world bringing peace and justice, moving the world towards its future as the Kingdom of God.

At 65 some will see me as a mere stripling, while others will see me as just old, either way it is good to see how far the world has come in those 65 years but clearly it is not yet the kingdom of God, so the work continues. That work, where it is taking place, should be praised and celebrated.

I do have one gripe, and that's having to wait an extra year for my pension.

Camps Chapel Community Hub



As many of you are aware, the URC Chapel property was removed from auction by the owners and the purchase by the Norden family is now complete.

Following the public meeting in December, an invite was sent out to those that requested to be kept informed for volunteers to come forward. This was to help establish an entity to manage and maintain the property once the purchase was completed. This created an initial voluntary group of thirteen individuals.

This group met on Sunday 18th February to discuss the current position and options for the long term management of the community asset. Based on legal advice, it was agreed by the group that the best way forward would be to establish a charitable entity (a Charitable Incorporated Organisation) which would be run by trustees from the community, with the express purpose of operating the property for the benefit of the community.

The group met again on 5th May once the purchase was complete and agreed that the charity name was to be **Camps Chapel Community Hub CIO** and the initial trustees are James Davey, Fiona Larcombe and Marion Searle. Further trustees to be appointed once the charity has been accepted by the Charities Commission. Once registered, the charity will then lease the property from the Norden family to operate it for the benefit of the community.

Activities regarding immediate repairs were discussed and basic operational considerations were agreed. Various initial fundraising suggestions were also raised for potential future events once the charity was registered. It was also agreed that to help minimise function and fundraising conflicts with other village organisations the trustees would reach out to the Village Hall Committee and the Village Events Committee to open lines of communications.

It was agreed that it was important to keep the local community updated so the committee shall continue to use email and articles in the Camps Review to maintain communications with parishioners. If anyone wishes to be added to the information email distribution then please send their email details to Graeme so that they can be included in the distribution list under GDPR rules.

If anyone wishes to join the volunteer committee to help guide and develop the community asset then again advise by email to Graeme and their details will be included in the charity committee email distribution. Again all communications are under GDPR rules.

We look forward to completing the registration of the charity to allow us to raise funds and organise events which in turn will allow us to manage the community asset. Community input on use of the facility and volunteers who wish to help make the facility a working reality are also invited. Donations are welcome to help bring the property meet legal requirements allowing it to be used and add value to the community. We are very grateful for donations which have already been made

The Hundred Parishes Society

The 19th century was a period of great railway development. Several railways in The Hundred Parishes no longer exist although they played an important role during their hundred-year lifetime.

The Saffron Walden Railway was constructed in 1865. It branched off the London-Cambridge main line and ran from Audley End Station to Saffron Walden. In 1866 it was extended to Bartlow, to link up with the Stour Valley Railway. Following loss of passengers and freight from rail onto road, a report in 1964 by Sir Richard Beeching identified many lines that were now deemed uneconomic; many stations and miles of track were decommissioned, including the Saffron Walden line.

In Hertfordshire, a line ran from St. Margarets to Buntingford, including stations at Braughing, Hadham, Standon and West Mill. The Buntingford Line was closed to passengers in 1964 and goods trains a year later. Buntingford Station, off Aspenden Road, is now a private residence.

Braughing station opened in 1863 and closed in 1964. It too is now a private residence but retains many of the original features including the platform, signal box and signals.

The Hundred Parishes Society (cont...)

Another line ran from Bishop's Stortford via Dunmow to Braintree. Much of this is now the Flitch Way Country Park, a 15 mile route that was opened in 1994 and is largely maintained by a group of volunteers, Friends of the Flitch Way. It is used by walkers, horse riders and cyclists and is part of National Cycle Network Route 16. The demise of the original rail line can't be blamed on Beeching - it closed in 1952 for financial reasons.

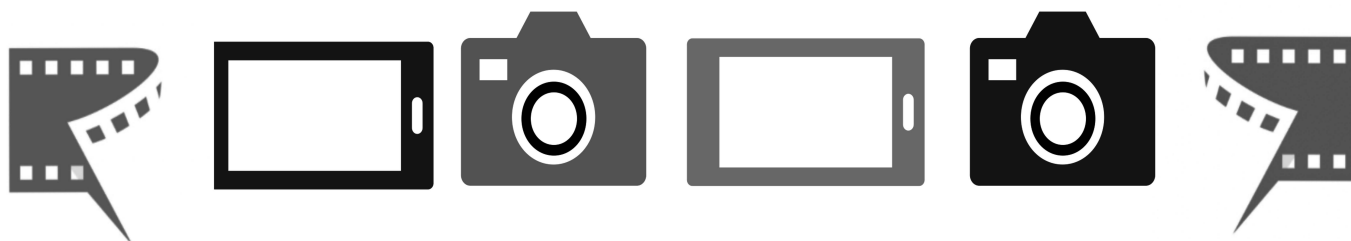
